Alnarpsparken

Deigned plant communities for dry conditions. Karin Svensson at the Swedish University of Agricultural Sciences is researching mixed perennial plantings for extreme urban growing conditions in Sweden. The plantings are characterised by high diversity and dynamics together with less amount of maintenance, compared to most other plantings. As a part of the research, Karin has planted a big field trial in Alnarp with perennial mixes for dry and sunny conditions, but also for dry shade. The aim of the project is to increase the use of perennials in public space in Swedish cities, despite tight budgets for maintenance of public green space. Karin will show the field trials and tell us about the project.

The Swedish National GenBank

The Swedish National Gene Bank preserves 2,300 historic varieties of fruit, berries, vegetables and ornamental plants, such as perennials and roses. These varieties have been cultivated in Sweden since before 1940, 1950, or 1960 - depending on the plant type - and were collected through the Swedish National Programme for Plant Genetic Resources (Pom). Between 2000 and 2010, Pom conducted several nationwide inventories to rediscover pre-WWII garden plants, when diversity was greater and assortments less standardized. During the inventories, not only plants were collected, but also stories, traditions and local names associated with the plants.

The gene bank consists of three parts: the central collection at the Swedish University of Agricultural Sciences in Alnarp, thirty-two regional clone archives and cultivation of berries in protected environments. The central collection includes five hectares of fields and one greenhouse used to conserve the unique collection of older garden plants. Varieties from the gene bank are selected and relaunched in the trade under the trademark "Grönt kulturarv" what means „Green Cultural Heritage”.

Lackalänga Trädgård

Lackalänga Trädgård is a family-owned perennial nursery founded in 2001 and run by the Holgersson family. The operation covers approximately three hectares of production area and is focused on growing plants for professional customers.

Today, more than 1.5 million plants are produced annually, comprising approximately 600 varieties of perennials, ornamental grasses, ferns, and herbs. Production is primarily outdoors and adapted to the Swedish climate. During peak season, the company employs around 25 staff members.

Production has been developed progressively through investments in facilities, technology, and the working environment. In recent years, peat use has been reduced by 50% in the standard growing substrate, with peat partially replaced by wood fibre, green compost, and biochar. A new product group is semi-bare-root perennials, which are grown to order.





Klinta Trädgård

In the fall of 2015, Peter Korn and his partner Julia Anderson bought an old nursery outside Höör and started Klinta trädgården. They created a large garden with many different rooms where they grow plants from all over the world. Peter is known for making sandbeds and has given several lectures at ISU Winterdays. They design many public and private perennial plantings. They grow the plants they use themselves in their nursery. They have a vision of making Klinta a meeting place for people in the horticultural field; landscape architects, nurserymen, ecologists and other people with great knowledge in their respective fields.

„With our shared knowledge, we can gain insight into the interaction between people, nature, gardens and landscapes. With the goal of helping to create sustainable and beautiful environments, public and private. As part of this, we arrange seminars, courses and conferences, so that people have the chance to meet, exchange knowledge and to enable the emergence of new networks.”



Slottsträdgården

A tranquil space in the heart of the city. Slottsträdgården is an organic garden that is open all year round, 24 hours a day. The Garden started as a citizens initiative in 1994 and was officially opened 1998. Here you can follow the changing seasons and enjoy both the still winter days and an abundance of flowering plants from spring to autumn. Slottsträdgården covers 12 000 square meter and consists of several smaller gardens with different styles and functions. On the plots we grow various annual flowers and vegetables each year and The Friend Association have 60 allotments on three of the plots. The garden is managed by the City of Malmö since 2003.



Malmö

The walk begins at Malmö Live and Citadellskajen, where trees from across the world are introduced to the dense urban setting. Here, vegetation is used to soften weather extremes, hard surfaces and create variation in form, seasonal change, and biodiversity.



Solhöjdsparken

Continuing to Solhöjdsparken, the focus shifts. The park integrates reused industrial structures with larger trees and plantings arranged for ecological resilience, play, and everyday use. Unlike the global showcase at Malmö Live, Solhöjdsparken demonstrates a more systematic landscape strategy, where vegetation is embedded in a framework of historical elements and functional design.

Torups slott & Slottspark

Torup Castle & Castle Park is one of the best-preserved Renaissance castles in the Nordic countries, with a castle park with traces from five centuries next to the Beech Forest. The castle park has been a popular destination for recreation for several decades and has been owned by the city of Malmö since the 1970s. The foundation for the park's current appearance dates back to the early 19th century when the owner family Coyet reintroduced water as an important element with a canal and spring water and established a walkway system that connects the castle with the surroundings. In addition to many exotic trees such as tulip trees, Chinese sequoia, plane trees, chestnuts, lilacs, real chestnuts and quinces, there is also a remarkable specimen of hornbeam and several walnut trees. Behind the castle you will find a hidden oasis, the recently restored walled garden from the beginning of the 20th century. There are two magnificent flower beds adjacent to the old walls with mixed plantings of perennials, fruit trees, various shrubs and bulbs, trimmed yew and summer flowers. The site also features a rose garden and a decorative kitchen garden, all in true Arts and Crafts spirit. The grass in the open clearing is grazed and cut with horse power. The maintenance of the park is carried out whenever possible using artisanal methods, which also creates experiences for our visitors.

Elinge Älgpark


Scenic moose park where everyone can feed the moose all day long. See the moose in a natural environment, and get really close to them. Watch them, pet them, take pictures and feed them.






Park Vargaslätten & Gerbianska Trädgården

Vargaslätten - a "Gesamtkunstwerk". Around the year 1900, many architects designed after the idea of a total work of art as an all-embracing art form, where the planning of houses also took into account the surrounding nature, art, craft and painting. For the architect Sigfrid Ericson, his 14-hectare large Vargaslätten was such a work of art: a unit from the Nordic-inspired house, its minimalist furniture, the rustic pe gola, the Japanese ornamental rock garden and his wife's Ruth's large utility garden. Everything is thought of as a unit. Inspired by the Arts & Crafts movement from England and with the admiration for traditional Swedish craftsmanship, a perfect Art Nouveau Garden was created here. minimalist furniture, the rustic pe gola, the Japanese ornamental rock garden and his wife's Ruth's large utility garden. At the same time, Vargaslätten became a cultural centre around the couple Ericson in the village Simlångsdalen. Sigfrid was also a plantsman and was in love in Lilies, Primroses and Gentians. He bought plants from nurseries in Europe and got plants from his friend Carl Skottsberg who started the Botanical Garden of Gothenburg. Still, you can find his beloved plants in the park.



The latest owner, Göran Johansson, and the plantsman Gerben Tjeerdsma got in contact with each other in 2019. A half year later Gerben moved his nursery to Vargaslätten and he started to maintain and restore the park.
